MISSION TEAM NOTES

Responding to a request from the **Circle of Light Homeless Shelter** on North Court, your Mission Team bought 20 pillows, protective pillow cases and cotton pillow cases.

We also voted to support the work of three PCUSA missionaries who serve in Africa, Dr. Daniel and Elizabeth Turk and Pastor Catherine Day.

The Turks have worked with the people of Madagascar for 20 years. **Dr. Turk** works with local farmers and teaches them how to improve their agricultural practices which has led to healthier diets and increased incomes. **Elizabeth** trains village health workers, helps communities develop safe drinking water sources and educates church leaders about AIDS prevention.

Pastor Day (Kay) is a professor at a seminary in Rwanda. She teaches English and trains her students in ways to facilitate reconciliation and build mutual respect in the aftermath of the 1994 genocide, and to find ways to change the barriers of economic and social oppression. Pastor Day is a colleague and friend of Pastor Jeri-Lynne.

Plan to join us in welcoming Pastor Day to our church on Sunday, May 1st, she will tell us about her work in Rwanda during worship. A luncheon in Campbell Hall will follow allowing an opportunity to ask questions. A free will offering to provide additional help for her work in Rwanda will be accepted.

This year we have a new opportunity to help children in need and those adults 19-30 years old who give a year to mission through the Young Adult Volunteer (YAV) program of the PCUSA. The **Pentecost Offering** focuses on these needs and **will be received May 15th**. Our congregation may retain 40% of the donations received to help meet the needs of the youth in our community.

Focus on.....

Diana Jones

She began her earthly journey in a Columbus hospital, but the family headed for Mt. Sterling when she was only six months old and she remained there until high school graduation. With her brother and her sister, she felt that she had good heritage being raised with a lot of love and caring for each other.

Childhood activities included Girl Scouts and 4-H where she even copped a blue ribbon for her bread at the Ohio State Fair. I thought she was going to tell me about the animal she had raised, but she added that her Dad did not believe girls should show animals.

When she matriculated to Ohio University, her dorm roommate was also from Mt. Sterling and together they won second place for their team entry of Frozen Jello Salad at a familiar place - the Ohio State Fair.

Her major at O.U. was Elementary Education with a minor in Social Work. She was adamant that it wasn't the party school for which it is now best known and it was there that she met Woody, her husband-to-be. In 1962 Bob Hope came to Athens to perform and the ushers were to be students in the Key Club and those who were Home Ec. Majors. Her roommate was the one studying culinary delights, but the night before the show, said roommate broke out in those identifying red spots of measles and was instructed, if possible, to get a substitute to usher. So, Diana easily agreed to be the sub.

Don't you love how we become threads in God's weaving of our lives? Woody was ushering in the same audience section for the performance. He was from Chillicothe, but a year behind her in school because his Dad had died and he stayed home to work for a year and help his Mom deal with recent widowhood. During their adult years, they became care-takers for his mother and her grandmother.

About a week after the Bob Hope Show, she had a date with a guy named George. In those days, when your date showed up, a phone call was made to your room to inform you that you had someone waiting. She looked at her watch and thought it strange that George was quite early, however she went down, looked around, didn't see him, and decided someone was playing a joke on her. Then came a voice from across the room. Woody remarked, "I guess I didn't make much of an impression on you if you don't remember me." She cancelled her date with

George and as some say, "The rest is history."

Diana graduated from O.U. in 1964 and began student teaching in Olmstead Falls, Ohio while Woody finished his university education. They were married in 1965 and honeymooned in various places in Canada after a brief stop at Niagara Falls. There was a small town of note in the land of 1,000 lakes, Kingston, Ontario, where one could purchase a non-refundable reservation for the daily cruise, which they did. The day dawned cold and cloudy, but those newlyweds knew how to keep each other warm, so off they went despite the weather.

Their first home was in Chillicothe where Andy was born and they moved to Circleville in 1970. While Woody was off judging a Rocket Contest, Diana was driving around town looking for a house they would be able to afford as there weren't many available in their price range. She saw a man standing by a "For Sale" sign in front of a home on Maumee. She and Woody returned shortly and agreed this was where they would like to live. Image her surprise to learn on the following day that they had bought the home of one of her fellow teachers at Allen Elementary in Chillicothe.

Son, Doug was born in Circleville in 1971. Her local teaching began with a class of three and four year-olds run by the YMCA in the old Armory on Franklin Street. Following that, she taught Pre-school for St. Philip's Episcopal Church for 20 years. As much as she adored getting down to their level, her knees began to object and she knew it was time to find a job where she could either stand or would be able to sit on an adult chair.

One hot Sunday afternoon in 1971, she and Woody were taking out trash and working in their yard. In deference to the temperature, they were wearing short shorts and according to her, "They were rather grimy," when a car pulled up in front. A gentleman emerged from his auto dressed "to the nines" in a suit, white shirt, and a tie. It was Rev. Henry Walters who said, "I just thought I'd stop by to help." He took off his suit coat, rolled up his sleeves, removed the shovel from her hand, as he and Woody continued with the yard work while Diana sat on the grass and supervised. Did I hear someone say, "Straw Boss"?

She was a cradle Presbyterian who had taught Sunday school when they lived in Chillicothe, so they joined our church shortly after. She jumped right into teaching Sunday school here and served on the Christian Education Committee or Commission – whatever it was called at that time. When the current D.C.E., Nancy Clendenin, decided to go to seminary, Lynn Kraus asked Diana if she would be interested in the job? That was when Diana knew she could leave

the Episcopal midgets, but still be involved with kids whom she loved so much.

She has a variety of hobbies – most of which she hopes to have more time to enjoy once she retires and moves to a Senior Living Complex in Wooster. Woody will be transferring to a care facility there, too. One goal, when she no longer concentrates on curriculum materials, is to get back to "fun" reading. Like many of us in her era, she grew up when family entertainment was playing cards and board games, which explains her love of Bridge. College football and basketball games more than professional ones spark her interest, as do all types of gardening from flowers to veggies and herbs. Since she became our D.C.E. she has attempted to support all the Presby kids' sports and artistic endeavors.

With the sudden death of her father many years ago and later her son, Doug, she learned that life goes on and you make the best of what you are dealt. She firmly believes God has a plan for her life. For example: she knew rather recently when it was the right time suddenly to change course and move closer to Andy and his family, which includes triplets who are about to turn thirteen.

Spiritually her favorite hymns are "O Master, Let Me Walk with Thee," and "In the Garden." Her grandmother's favorite scripture is now hers. Romans 8:28: "We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose."

God Speed, Diana. We will miss you.

FOOD PANTRY NOTES

Donations from our congregation to the FOOD PANTRY have been low this year. There are many needs in the community to support but we hope you will consider buying non-perishable staples to replenish the Pantry's shelves.

There are also other ways to contribute. If you would like to help stock the shelves with donations from Walmart and Kroger, come Monday, Wednesday or Friday from 9-10:30. Food is delivered from Mid-Ohio Food Bank on the second and fourth Thursdays beginning at 8:45. To help during distribution Monday-Friday from 1-4, call Mary Easter at 740-477-1655 ext 263.

The FOOD PANTRY is located at the rear of the PICCA building. If going south on Clinton Street, turn left into the drive located just before the railroad track crossing. Follow the road and turn left when you approach the buildings.

Report from the Facility Care Team of Session

We need maintenance on the organ. Jack Mader has pointed out that some keys on the organ do not work. He says there are problems with the "leathers" and the bearings on the blower which supply air to the organ. He "plays around" those keys, but the problem will only get worse. The organ has not had major repairs in about 20 years.

Jack estimates repairs could cost over \$100,000. We do not presently have that much money.

There are not many options for choosing an organ repair company with the needed experience and skills. One company requires a down payment and a lead time of months. We may need to make a commitment for the repairs yet this year if repairs are to be done in 2017.

There are also not many options when it comes to financing the repairs. If we are to have the repairs made in the summer of 2017, we need to start raising funds now. These are some options:

- (1). We have an endowment account, the Jackie Whitfield Fund, which may be used for capital improvements and repairs. It is presently about \$134,000. However, this fund is restricted so that only the interest, not the principle, may be spent each year. The Whitfield family may agree to alter the endowment to make the principle available. However, if we use all the money available, there will not be money available in the future for routine repairs. The Charles Will Organ Repair has about \$19,000 available which could be used for repairs, but also would not leave any money for future repairs.
- (2). Start a pledge campaign to raise \$100,000.
- (3). We could do "stop gap" repairs fixing only selected keys. This may not be possible; we need the advice of the organ repair company to determine if this is feasible. This would be the most expensive way to do repairs because it could become a yearly routine.
- (4). Do nothing. Abandon the pipe organ. When our current organists choose to retire we may not be able to find future organists to replace them at a reasonable expense.
- (5). Replace the pipe organ with a less expensive electronic organ.
